Truthful lips endure forever, but a lying tongue lasts only a moment. Proverbs 12 v19 NIV



VIDEO REVIEW: Cinematography? Well done. Soundtrack? Reflective and calming. Content? intriguing and relatable.

The video presented a study in which Redwood trees were injected with a substance similar to adrenaline to keep them from going dormant. The injected trees died because they weren't allowed the natural cycle of wintering.

The video's message was that this can happen to us as well if we're always too busy with no seasons of rest. And that can be true. But the video was inaccurate. There never was such a study. Redwoods are evergreens and never go dormant. And the trees in the video were giant Sequoias not coastal Redwoods. As thoughtful as the video seemed to be, it was based on falsehoods. FAKE NEWS!

We find ourselves living in an age where, due to our technologies, lies are sometimes magnified and multiplied to try and convince us they're true. The Book of Proverbs, that compendium of godly wisdom, speaks often of the stark difference between truth and lies. Truthful lips endure forever, says the proverb, but a lying tongue lasts only a moment. And the very next adage tells us: Deceit is in the hearts of those who plot evil, but those who promote peace have joy. (v 20). Honesty applies to everything from God's commands to videos about wintering. The Truth Endures Forever. How might you wisely question the narrative of what you see, hear and experience? How will you live out your commitment to the truth? Dear God, please give me discernment as I daily pursue what's true.

A message from Liz Delafield, ECDB Steering Group Convenor

Hello everyone,

I am excited to be taking up a new role as steering group convenor for the East Cheshire and Derbyshire Borders Missional partnership. (I am still Mission and Discipleship Mentor here too).

The role of the convenor is to chair the Steering Group, and to support the ministers, elders and congregations of the partnership to work together for Mission. Each of the churches has a representative on the steering group. We meet together once every couple of months to reflect, pray and work together.

Our next meeting will be reflecting on how the call process for new ministers operates in our partnership, addressing some concerns that were expressed to us. I know several churches have been collecting ideas about this to feed back to us. We will also be finding out more about the Church Life Review.

Calling all Preachers and Worship Leaders

I'd like to let you know about some opportunities for preachers and worship leaders in our area.

A new Stepwise Faith Filled Worship in person 1. **group.** Due to a recent change, participants are no longer required to do the faith filled life course first, so this group is open to anyone who feels it would support them as a worship leader or preacher, or simply to reflect on the role of worship in their discipleship. I am hoping that this change will enable more people to step forward. Faith Filled Worship is a year-long course (meeting once a month for about 2 hours) for preachers, worship leaders and anyone interested in reflecting on worship. It is part of the URC's Stepwise discipleship programme. It is also the first step to becoming a Synod Recognised Worship Leader (although there is no requirement that people taking the course would go on to do this). If your church has a few people who want to do this together, that would be great. Please let me know whether: a. You, or others from your church, would like to be in the group. b. your church would offer to host. Once we have a group together, we will plan the group according to the participants' availability.

2. **South area Worship leaders gathering.** Alicia Jones (the South area lay preacher advocate) and I would like to organise an in person gathering sometime in October for lay preachers and worship leaders to share resources and get to know each other. Date and time to be confirmed. This could lead to a regular gathering if this is what people feel they need. Again, please let us know if you would be interested.

Also please let me know whether you would like to be on our contact list for lay preacher and worship leader opportunities in the South area.

Creationtide: Each year from **September 1 to October 4**, the Christian family unites for this worldwide celebration of prayer and action to protect our common home. It is a special season where we celebrate God as Creator. As followers of Christ from around the globe, we share a common call to care for Creation. This is known as Creationtide or the season of creation. There are lots of fabulous resources. Just search "Season of Creation" in your internet browser or get in touch and I can post some to you.

It is a book filled with hope, reminding us that we could live a flourishing and truly sustainable life.

This is also an excellent time of year to look at your church Eco Church plan. Care for creation is an important part of Mission. Whether you are just starting out, or looking at your next step, one of my roles is to support churches with Eco Church, so do get in touch.

THE WOOD WIDE WEB

Trees communicate with other trees via complex underground networks which make up what has been called the Wood Wide Web.

This has led to the thinking that forests are not just a collection of individual trees but instead are interconnected communities.

Scientific proof is growing that trees can send messages to each other, as well as distress signals when one tree is facing a threat from pests or diseases, so that fellow trees can strengthen their defences. They can also help sustain each other by sharing nutrients and water underground.

The interaction happens largely through fungi which as well as acting to decompose dead wood into fertiliser, also allow trees to communicate. Thin threads from fungi will attach to the tip of a root and then spread out beneath the ground and attach to the roots of other trees, forming a connection (sometimes even between different species). These are known as mycorrhizal networks. Messages that could be sent might include a warning that a tree is under attack from a swarm of insects.

A German forester called Peter Wolleben helped spread the idea that trees are sophisticated social beings that work together in his best-selling book *The Hidden Life of Trees: What They Feel, How They Communicate*, and science is coming to largely back that up.

Some trees can also send out messages above ground to help protect themselves. When a pine tree, for example, is threatened by aphids, it can call in help. It can send out a strong scent designed to attract ladybirds to the tree that will then act as predators to eat the aphids.

Trees can also protect themselves by deterring animals when they come under attack. There is evidence that if the leaves of beech trees are being eaten by deer, then the tree can send a chemical to its leaves to make them taste bitter and put the animals off.

In Africa, when acacia trees are chewed by giraffes, the tree can send out a warning signal of ethylene gas into the air. When neighbouring trees pick up this scent from the gas, they then pump tannins into their own leaves to put off any animals that might attempt to graze on them.

Henry Alford




Henry Alford was an English Churchman, theologian, scholar poet, hymnodist and writer. He published several volumes of his own verse, and a number of hymns, the best known of which are "Come, ye thankful people, come" This popular Harvest Festival hymn was written by Revd. Henry Alford and first published in his Psalms and Hymns

[1844]. It has been revised through the years and reduced from the original seven to the now popularised version of four stanzas, and "Ten Thousand times ten thousand"

Come, ye thankful people, come echoes two of Christ's parables; Matthew 13:24-30 [the wheat and the tares] and Mark 4:26-29 [the story of the seed springing up without the sower knowing of it]. This latter text includes the words: "All by itself the earth produces corn. First the stalk, then the ear, then the full grain. As soon as the grain is ripe, he puts a sickle to it, because the harvest has come." Through the years the hymn has been greatly altered, and Alford himself was critical of some of the early revisions.



Marple Bridge URC Harvest Service

We are planning to have our Harvest Service at Marple Bridge URC on Sunday 28th September.

Once again we shall be supporting Commitment For Life projects in Bangladesh. Throughout the last year we have been supporting various projects in Bangladesh with the money collected over our Harvest period last September. Here is an update on one of them.

Hamida relied solely on her husband's unreliable income as a day labourer to support her family. As president of a local women's group she was invited to join Gender Transformative Climate Resilience Microfinance training sessions, where she learned livestock management, poultry raising and agricultural techniques. Through Commitment For Life, supporting a Christian Aid Loan Project, Hamida secured a loan to buy a cow and a calf. By selling the milk in her community and then repaying her loan she has managed to buy more cattle, securing regular income for her family.

As we can see, giving through Commitment for Life can enable real change to happen, where life and income are precarious.

Thank you in advance for your support again this Harvest time. Envelopes for giving or details of giving online will be circulated in September via your Elder.

We shall also be collecting tins of food etc to support The Wellspring and the Oasis Centre in Gorton.

LEND WITH CARE

Thank you to all who have contributed to Lend with Care over the last the past few months. I have donated a further £75 to our account. With this money and £100 in repayments we have received recently, we have made two new loans.

We have lent £100 to Mai, a 62 year old widow, mother of two. She is actively involved in raising cattle, including water buffaloes and cows. After receiving training on sustainable farming practices - such as using natural feed and improving waste recycling systems-Mai has applied for a loan to upgrade her livestock facilities. She wants to purchase 70 metres of corrugated roofing sheets, 70 bags of cement and other building materials to repair the barns and construct a waste storage tank. Her goal is to ensure a clean and safe environment for both her animals and family, while improving productivity.

The second loan of £75 is to Anaya Bibb who live with husband and two sons in Katsura, Pakistani. Anaya works as a yarn extractor by collecting discarded sweaters. She extracts the high quality yarn and supplies it to local buyers and shops, providing them with an ecofriendly asset which reduces textile waste and contributes to a greener environment. She's been running her business for over six years and brings in £34 per month. Anaya has applied for a loan to expand her business by purchasing worn-out sweaters and garments in bulk. As well as reinforcing sustainable textile practices and reducing waste, this investment will enhance her production capacity and thereby. Increase her income.

Hopefully our small loans will help Mai and Anaya reach their loan target quickly and they can soon benefit from their improvements. Thank you again to everyone.
